### Use this graphic organizer to help write your speech...

It is a great idea when writing a speech to take some time to organize your thoughts. This helps you to put your information in order in a way that will make sense to your audience. Below, we have provided a graphic organizer to help with this. Do this weeks or days before you have to give your speech.

Answer the questions in the boxes (you may have to re-create it on a different page to have enough space to write). Under the Main Idea boxes there are boxes for Important Details, write in something that relates to the Main Idea with the border that matches the Detail boxes. Use this space to add information that is interesting about your main idea. You are not limited to the questions in the Main Idea boxes. Feel free to be creative and find other information about the character trait from your story that you want to share with your audience.

When you have those boxes filled out then write your Introduction and then your Conclusion/Summary. "Hook" your audience with an interesting quote, statistic or question that relates to the character trait from your story. Then add details to your boxes below to build interest in your topic. When you write your summary/conclusion, refer back to the most important points about your character trait that you wanted your audience to remember and either repeat or refer back to your attention getting statement at the beginning to wrap up your speech.


